A textile designer is **an expert** who focuses on **crafting patterns** and **textures for fabrics**. They operate across **multiple sectors**, such as fashion, home decor, and interior design. Their job entails **creating new designs** that will be printed, woven, or knitted into fabrics, which are then **used to make clothing and accessories**.






To thrive in this field, a textile designer requires not only **a strong aesthetic sense** but also **a solid understanding of computer-aided design tools** (like Adobe Photoshop and Illustrator), **production techniques**, and the **characteristics of various materials**.

Weaving is a technique that involves arranging threads on a loom. This creates fabric with vertical warp threads and horizontal weft threads. The warp threads run lengthwise, while the weft threads run widthwise across the loom. There are different weaving methods, such as plain weave, double weave, twill weave, satin weave, and jacquard weave. Each method produces unique patterns and effects in the finished fabric.











Inaugurated in **2020**, this **68,000-seat stadium** was built specifically for the **2022 FIFA World Cup** in **Qatar**. Its unique design draws inspiration from the traditional "bayt al sha'ar" tents of the **nomadic Gulf region**. Qatar aimed to create a stadium reflecting its culture and heritage.

Additionally, the stadium is **demountable**; after the World Cup, its upper section will be **repurposed into a 5-star hotel** and a **shopping center**. This eco-friendly stadium utilizes **solar energy** for the parking lot and surrounding park lights, and it is designed to convert its surroundings into a **camel racing track**.
